Clash To Do College Concert

OSWEGO - The SUNY Oswego Program Policy Concert Board will sponsor The Clash in concert on Sunday evening.

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The show begins at 8 p.m. in Laker Hall on the college campus. Tickets are \$7:50 for Student Association members and \$10 for non-SA members. All tickets are \$10 the day of the show.

The group was formed in early summer of 1976 in West London when Paul Simonon and Mick Jones, aware of a growing attitude in London at that time that disregarded the rock and roll establishment and musical ability, decided to join

Today the five-man band consists of Joe Strummer on vocals; Paul Simonon on bass guitar; Vince White, guitar; Nick Sheppard, guitar; and Pete Howard,

However, today's lineup has not always been; the group has been through several personnel changes

since the early days. At the early formation of ne group, Keith Levine joined Simonon and Jones on guitar, and Joe Strummer accepted the group's offer as lead singer. Terry Chimes then joined on drums and the group then moved into an old railway warehouse in North London, where Simonon named them The Clash.

After just several live shows, however, Levine left and Chimes soom followed. But, The Clash went on to sign, in January, 1977, a worldwide recording contract with CBS Records and recorded their debut album in three weekends. After auditioning 206 drummers, the group was also able to fill the vacancy Levine left with Nicky "Topper" Headon.

The Clash arrived in the United States in February of 1979 for their first American tour. Drummer Pete Howard arrives in May of 1983 and then in September of 1983 Strummer and Jones decided than Jones should leave the group because if is felt that

he has drifted apart from the original idea of The Clash. White and Sheppard were added to the lineup earlier

The musical production will run through May 2, with all but the final performance beginning at 8:15 p.m. Curtain time May 2 will be 7


